

n September 14, the city of Kokand played host to the inaugural ceremony of the first International Festival of Folk Applied Arts.

In his opening remarks, President of the Republic of Uzbekistan Shavkat Mirziyoyev cordially congratulated the participants and expressed gratitude to foreign guests for their attention and respect for our country, for the festival.

"An integral part of the universal human culture, folk applied arts occupy a special place in the life of every nation, in the formation of its mindset and values. Indeed, the emergence of crafts was an important historic step towards civilisation," the head of state noted.

Shavkat Mirziyoyev quoted our great ancestor - the saint and artisan Bahouddin Naqshband. The President noted that the work of masters of applied arts is highly appreciated in Uzbekistan, there are great opportunities for young people to master the handicrafts, and this festival will ultimately prove instrumental in the further development of this artistic industry.

"I believe this international festival is an outstanding celebration not only for the multiethnic people of Uzbekistan, but also for artisans and craftspeople around the world. This is a forum of genuine friendship and cooperation, a medium that harmoniously combines the distant past and present, traditions and values of a great diversity of nations, that unites hearts close in spirit," Shavkat Mirziyoyev pointed out.

The festival is organised in accordance with a presidential resolution signed November 1, 2018. In anticipation of this holiday of applied arts, an important event took place in the life of Kokand - the World Crafts Council (WCC International) awarded it the high status of the World City of Artisans.

Rosy Greenlees, OBE, President of WCC International, also delivered a speech at the ceremony.

The square where the festival takes place is decorated accordingly. Exhibitions of artisans from Karakalpakstan and all regions of Uzbekistan are organised here.

After the opening ceremony, President Shavkat Mirziyoyev walked through with these expositions, talked with artisans.

The International Festival of Folk Applied Arts will be held every two years. The event is attended by over 370 craftspeople, art historians and journalists from 78 countries.







n October 16, the President of the Republic of Uzbekistan Shavkat Mirziyoyev took part in the opening ceremony of the 25th session of the General Assembly of the World Tourism Organization (UNWTO), the events of which will proceed in Samarkand until 20 October.

In recent years, a visa-free regime for nationals of around 100 countries was introduced. A simplified procedure for issuing an electronic visa for nationals of another 55 countries was established.

arriving in Uzbekistan doubled. Revenues from the export of services increased 4 times. It is estimated that nearly 7 million tourists will visit our country this year. It is planned to increase this figure to 15 million by 2030 and the flow of domestic tourists up to 25 million people.

Our large-scale work is being recognised by the international community. In particular, Uzbekistan ranks high in international ratings as the safest and rapidly developing tourism sector.

The Head of Uzbekistan stated that the development of modern tourism and transport infrastructure will be prioritised within the 2030 Strategy on Comprehensive Tourism Development. New high-speed roads and railways will be built, the fleet will be doubled, and the number of flights will be quadrupled. In big cities and places often visited by tourists, 30 large tourist clusters will be established.

According to the National program "Pearls of Ancient History", the number of tourist attractions will be increased from 800 to 2.5 thousand, 745 cultural heritage sites will be restored, and "open-air museums" will be created in 20 architectural monuments.

As part of the pilgrimage tourism program, the number of tourists will increase more than threefold compared to today's figure.

The focus will be on creating joint tourist routes with the Central Asian states.

In general, as a result of the ongoing work on tourism development, at least 1 million new jobs planned to be created in the future.



In his address at the main forum of the top Eavourable conditions for conducting all organisation in tourism sector, with the representatives of over 140 countries participating, the Head of our state put forward a number of important initiatives to further develop the sector.

The Uzbek Leader noted that today, tourism is one of the dynamically developing and promising sectors of the world economy. Uzbekistan attaches great priority to the tourism development within large-scale and irreversible reforms on the modernisation of types of tourism business are created, tax and customs benefits are provided, as well as credit and financial support are strengthened. Despite the restrictions of the pandemic, over 800 infrastructure projects have been implemented in two years.

The number of hotel beds increased to 140 thousand, 70 new tourist routes opened, and 6 private airlines started operating.

As a result, the number of foreign tourists





At the same time, the Leader of Uzbekistan noted that "today, the pressing problem of global tourism is ensuring a guaranteed safety system for tourists". The Head of our state proposed to develop a Global Safe Tourism Code within the UN in order to strengthen the legal framework in international tourism.

In the context of the growing climate change problems, the topicality of the adoption of the International Actions Program on Green Tourism Development was underscored. As practical steps, it was proposed to establish the nomination "The Best City Promoting Green Tourism" within the UNWTO, as well as to create a Global Green Tourism Startups' Laboratory based on the Central Asian Green University and the "Silk Road" International University of Tourism and Cultural Heritage in Samarkand.

In order to further improve the conditions for travellers with disabilities and develop the inclusive tourism infrastructure, the President of Uzbekistan proposed to declare 2025 as the World Inclusive Tourism Year and adopt a special declaration.

The expediency of creating a Council of Historical Cities for Tourism within the UNWTO, a platform for sharing advanced experience in the preservation of historical monuments, was noted. Readiness to hold the first meeting of the Council in the city of Bukhara was expressed.

The President announced allocating special grants to train specialists in the newly established International Tourism Academy in Samarkand, which is a unique UNWTO educational institution for the training and advanced training of personnel in the tourism sector.

The President also proposed to hold the next Global Youth Tourism Summit in Tashkent, which will become an important platform for youth to generate new ideas and projects for the development of the sector.

The initiative to establish a special UNWTO international award for contribution to the promotion of the "Silk Road" brand was put forward. The Thematic Office "The Silk Road" established in Samarkand will be actively engaged in the implementation of this plan.

Attention was drawn to the importance of establishing the Global Media Campus and holding its forums every two years as part of the General Assembly sessions. Readiness to host the first media campus in Uzbekistan was expressed.

As part of the program of the 25th session of the General Assembly of the World Tourism Organization (UNWTO) held in the city of Samarkand, in the presence of the President of the Republic of Uzbekistan Shavkat Mirziyoyev, the Declaration on awarding Samarkand the status of "the World Cultural Tourism Capital" and the Agreement on the establishment of the International Tourism Academy were adopted.

The Minister of Ecology, Environmental Protection and Climate Change of the Republic of Uzbekistan Aziz Abdukhakimov and the Secretary-General of UNWTO Zurab Pololikashvili signed the documents.

The Head of our state encouraged delegates to support the initiative of announcing Samarkand as the World Cultural Tourism Capital and adopt a declaration.

Concluding his speech, the President wished a successful holding of the General Assembly and achievement of new breakthrough results.

Let me cite one example.

The astounding mysterious ornaments, truly divine patterns, and the unique colours of one type of our national embroidery, "suzane", that enjoys worldwide fame, embody cosmogonic imaginations of distant ancestors.

Our people have always revered skilful artisans, genuine masters of their craft, deferentially calling them usta (master) and ustazoda (descendants of masters).

In this regard, I think it will be apt to recall the wise maxim of the outstanding thinker Bahouddin Nagshband, whose 700th anniversary we will celebrate next year. "Craft is like a fabulous ambler, on whose wings one can reach the highest levels recognition and respect of the people".

Nagshband was not just a great Sufi and philosopher, but also a wonderful craftsman, spiritual mentor of artisans. And today, following his covenant that said "Let your heart be with Allah and your hands - at work", thousands of folk masters in our country, with their hard and honest labor and the best human qualities, serve as an example for many, especially the young people.

In the meantime, in this age of globalisation and high technology, we, unfortunately, often encounter lack of serious attitude to this unique art, stating allegedly that it is only a relic of the distant past. If we do not support the folk arts widely, at the public level, tomorrow may be too late handicrafts could end up unable to withstand fierce competition from serial production.

In this regard, such international forums as this one are important for the careful preservation, revival and advancement of folk crafts throughout the world, for the transfer of the traditions of artisans on to future generations, for the unification of our efforts and opportunities along this path.

In Uzbekistan, we have been fashioning essential legal foundations for the effective creative work of artisans and deserved appraisal of their job; they are granted a great deal of benefits and preferences. The Hunarmand Association, for instance, unites thousands of craftspeople and is designed to protect their rights and interests.

> As a bright confirmation of the considerable significance attached to the services and merits of representatives of this sphere, the celebrated Bukhara-based master of gold embroidery Muyassar Temirova, the brilliant restorer Mirumar Asadov from Samarkand, as well as the famed woodcarver Abdugani Abdullayev from Ferghana have been rewarded with a high title of Hero of Uzbekistan.

We are creating extensive opportunities for fostering a younger generation as harmoniously advanced personalities, for them to master modern

knowledge and professions as well as folk crafts. Dozens of festivals and fairs, exhibitions, contests, and handicraft schools for youth are there in the capital and provinces. Crucially, people of this industry have been making remarkable contribution to creating new jobs, attracting young people to socially significant work, and developing tourism.



okand is located in Eastern Uzbekistan at the southwestern edge of the Fergana Valley, about 230 km southeast of Tashkent and close to the border with Tajikistan and is perhaps the most attractive city for a tourist in the Uzbek Fergana Valley. Kokand is the valley's first important town on the road from Tashkent being a gateway to the region and a stopping spot for many pilgrims. Kokand is one of the most popular cities in Uzbekistan, once the capital of the powerful Kokand Khanate that dominated the whole Fergana and other even larger regions during its hey

A traveler on his way to Ferghana from other parts of Uzbekistan, first arrives in Kokand as the Soviet past has cut the most natural way to the mouth of Fergana valley which is part of Tajikistan. Kokand has preserved much of its wealthy history, from the large and magnificent palace of Khudyar Khan to the Juma Mosque and a large collection of madrassas and other old structures that with a bit of imagination will bring the visitor back at least couple of hundreds of years.

HISTORY

According to the numerous pilgrims' descriptions notes, the city of Kokand has been populated at least since the 10th century when the town was known as Khavakend and located on a caravan route between India and China but it was not a major player in the region that time. Kokand village was only fortified by the Shaybanid ruler Shahrukh in the early 18th century. As the influence of his khanate grew, so did the scale of the city.

Defined as the town of the boar' or the more mysterious 'city of winds, Kokand lent its name to the powerful 18th-19th century khanate stretching from the Ferghana Valley to Tashkent and all the way to the Southern Kazakh steppes.

Though young compared to other Ferghana valley cities, Kokand quickly bloomed into a flourishing trading and religious center, competing of the spoils of Central Asia with the khanates of Bukhara and Khiva. During its peak, Kokand Khanate and its capital were Central Asia's leading powers and a religious center of Central Asia, with its at least 35 madrasas and hundreds of mosques. It also became a wealthy supporter of popular poets, writers, scholars, art and culture. The power of

Kokand faded when the Russian empire finally reached Fergana valley in the end of 19th century.

SIGHTS

Kokand old town center is fairly compact and it is best seen by walking. Most of the sights are located along two main roads or a little walk away in the narrow winding allies of the old town which are also an experience. Between the sightseeing one can always sit down to a restaurant, catch some local delicacies and plan for the next sights to see.

The majority of restaurants and shops are just next in a 1 km extent of Istiklol street, running east-west between Mugimi Park and Abdulla Nabiev maydoni square. The mosque-sprinkled old town alleys squeezed between Khamza, Akbar Islamov and Furgat streets constrain for good wandering and it is easy to lose one's bearings while walking.

KHUDAYAR KHAN PALACE



Khudyar Khan Palace is Kokand's most and most central inKokand city. remarkable sight and one of the most glittering royal residences in central Asia's history. This majestic and notable building serves as a reminder of the last ruler of the Kokand Khanate and is located in the central park called Mugimi. Originally it had as much as 119 rooms and almost half of them were dedicated to the

harems of the Khan. Khudayar Khan palace deserves its own

DAHMAN-SHAKHON COMPLEX

Dahman-Shakhon (sometimes Dahkha i Shokhon) complex contains the Narbutabey Mosque, Mir Medressa, Modari-Khan mausoleum and Dakhma-i-Shakhon tomb. It is situated in the

old part of Kokand. The Dahman Shakhon complex is located next to a large cemetery straight east from the Khudayar palace, further east from Furqat street making it the perfect sight to find by walking through the



old town alleys.

STONE TABLET OF NODIRA

Nodira was the famed poet, wife of Omar Khan's widow. She was originally buried in the Modari-Khan mausoleum until she was adopted in the mid-20th century by the

> Soviets as a model Uzbek woman and moved to this prominent place under a white stone tablet, behind Dakhma-i-Shakhon.

NARBUTABEY MOSQUE

The Narbutabey mosque was built in 1799 in the western part of the central graveyard on Chorsu square of Kokand. Norbutabey was a religious person and during his reign, 120 mosques were built in Kokand. Being one of the last mosques, today it's the biggest

The area of the mosque and accompanying madrassa is 52m x 72m. After the independence of Uzbekistan, the madrassa opened again as a mosque with 85 students, the number of which has grown to 100



today.

DAKHMA-I-SHAKHON TOMB



Dakhma-i-Shakhon is a tomb of the Kokand rulers, which sits in the graveyard. It was built during Umar's reign for the Khans and their family members and is surrounded by a fence. There is also a place for prayer Ziarathona, where Umar is buried.

The entrance doors are carved with an original Arabic inscription from the Quran and some of Umar-Khan's poetry. The monument was restored in 1971 by local artisans



MODARI KHAN MAUSOLEUM

Modari-Khan is in the central graveyard. It was built in 1825 for Umar-Khan's mother, on the orders of his wife, Nodira-Begim. Its area is 7.5×8.5 m and it is one of the most interesting examples of Muslim architecture.

KOKAND JUMA MOSQUE



AND MINARET

Perhaps the Kokand's most fascinating architectural structure is the Juma mosque

(Friday mosque). The most striking feature of the mosque are the long rows of wooden pillars supporting the colourfully decorated

roofs. The mosque is established south of Mukimi Park along Turkestan (ex-Lenin) Street, where the road forks beside the Ghuldasta teahouse to cross the Kokand canal bridge that once divided old and new Kokand.

The mosque is centred around a 22 m tall minaret and includes a colourful 100 m long aivan (portico) supported by 98 red-wood columns brought from India and decorated in the diverse colour and carving of

traditional Ferghana architecture.

Built by Omar Khan between 1809 and 1812 as a magnified version of the rural Ferghana design, it was shutin Soviet times and reopened after restoration in 1989.

The entire Kokand Friday mosque complex has returned to its former Soviet guise as a museum, with one room housing a collection of suzani and ceramics from the region.

Next to the mosque sits the Amin Beg Madrassah, built for one of Madali's sons in 1830, although often named after Khornol Khozi, the 1913 restorer responsible for the ornamental facade of coloured

tiles. The madrassah reopened after Uzbekistan's independence, only to be closed again and reopen as a museum/ shop.



KOKAND ZINBARDOR MOSQUE

Zinbardor mosque is a good example of the hidden mosques around the old town of Kokand. There are dozens of others also to be found just by wandering around the streets. Zinbardor mosque does not look like much from the outside but houses some original wooden parts from the 18th century.

KHAMZA HOUSE MUSEUM

Khamza house museum was opened in

1989 on the 100th anniversary of Khakim Khakimzade Niyazi's birth. This museum presents the life story of Kokand's first Soviet hero, the first national poet of Uzbekistan and the founder of Uzbek Soviet literature Khakim Khakimzade Niyazi. The museum is a three-story structure located at 2 Akbar Islam St, north of Khamza's statue in Furkat Park and the striking Khamza Musical Comedy and Drama Theatre.

Born in the doctor's family, Khamza attended an Uzbek school and madrassah before a mixed Russian school expanded his horizons. Early works in the Uzbek classical style dealt with the social themes of a Turkestan slowly waking to progressive ideas. He opened schools in a lifelong push for public enlightenment and soon became an active Bolshevik propagandist. Throwing himself into theatre, he organised a drama



company in Ferghana in 1918, performing plays like "The Bey (landlord) and the Farmhand" in which, against a backdrop of social injustice meeting bold revolution, the Uzbek character Gafur welcomes his Russian comrades with good proletarian internationalism.

For the next decade, Khamza was a young republic, teaching and composing. He was an enthusiastic fighter for a new life and unappeasable enemy of obscurantism". A new play called "The Mysteries of the Paranja" which exposed female freedom touched the sensitive topics after which Khamza's torture and assassination in 1929.

MEDRESE SOKHIBZODA KHAZRAT

This madrasah was built by the major religious and public figure Sohibzade Hazrat (1827-1860) who was a significant religious and public figure.

Hazrat moved to Kokand from Peshawar (Pakistan) in 1825 by the invitation of the Kokand Khan. Later in this madrassah housed poets like



The museum has more than 150 exhibits of products of foreign craftsmen who participated in the First International Crafts Festival held in 2019, including countries such as Malaysia, Iran, New Zealand, Australia, China, India, Kazakhstan, and Kyrgyzstan. An international scientific-practical conference on the topic "World practice in the field of preservation and development of traditional

arts and crafts" was held at the Kokan city musical drama theatre.





An exhibition and trade of international local craftsmen is held within the framework of the festival. More than 100,000 citizens visited the festival every day for two days. A total of 6 billion 592 million soums worth of handicraft products were sold over two days. Trading continues today. The International Pottery Forum organised in Rishton District is also being held in conjunction with the 2nd International Craft Festival in Kok. In general, each day leaves a great impression on the participants based on the colourful programs.

The festival will end today and the winners of the competition will be announced.

Kokand - Preserving ancient culture through millennia

he first information about Kokand dates back to the second century BC and came to us in the notes of the Chinese traveler Zhan Jiang "On a trip to the state of Davan." Davan is the ancient name of the Fergana Valley.

In those ancient times, Kokand was part of a confederal state and was one of its developed centres. The data was confirmed by archaeological excavations, which were carried out on the remains of the ancient settlements of Muyi Mubarak and Tepakurgan.

In the result of the excavations, among other finds, high-quality handicraft products had discovered. Due to the quality of handicrafts it was concluded that there was an urban-type settlement at the excavation site in the second century AD.

In the Middle Ages, Kokand was destroyed by the troops of Genghis Khan and only in the seventeenth centuries the city received a "second wind" with the beginning of the history of the Kokand Khanate.

The Kokand Khanate, which in its heyday included the territories of modern Tajikistan, Kyrgyzstan, partly Kazakhstan, China and Afghanistan, is the most famous and studied period in the history of Kokand.

All modern architectural monuments date back to this period and the period of the

colonial conquest by Russia.

Kokand undoubtedly experienced a special flourishing and restoration of its former greatness during the reign of the current President of the Republic of

Uzbekistan, Shavkat Mirziyoyev.

According to his decree "On holding the International Festival of Folk Arts and Crafts in the city of Kokand," a huge amount of work was carried out in the city in 2019 to reconstruct architectural monuments, improve the tourism infrastructure and the appearance of the city as a whole.

I remember very well how, on the eve of the festival, Ghada Qaddumi, President of the Asian and Pacific region of the World Crafts Council (mother of Saad al Kaddumi), visited Kokand. Together with the Vice President of the Society of Australian Craftsmen, Kevin Murray, we studied handicrafts in Kokand. The guests were introduced to wood carving, knife making, weaving and other crafts in Kokand.

During a conversation in the workshop of one of the woodcarving artisans, Kevin



Murray suddenly asked the question: How many types of crafts are known in Kokand? More than 200 responded.

Kevin turned with a condescending smile to the author of the remark - Yahyo Dadaboev, an employee of the Kokand Reserve Museum, repeated, "maybe even more."

Kevin Murray turned on the voice recorder on his phone and said, "If you now say the names of at least 50 crafts, I will raise my hands." Yakhe Dadabaev began to list the crafts, simultaneously mentioning the regions (mahallas) of Kokand named after these crafts. At the 55th craft, Kevin Murray raised his hands and He said with a smile, "I give up."

Gadda Kaddumi urgently began to get ready for the hotel. The mayor of Kokand was surprised by such a rush. He asked the translator, "Maybe the lady didn't like something?" Kaddoumi replied, "I'm rushing to the hotel to urgently write a letter to Rosie Greenles about including Kokand in the list of World Crafts Cities.

The First International Festival of Handicrafts was attended by 570 participants from 78 countries and 1,200 artisans from various regions of Uzbekistan. Kokand was announced as one of the World Craft Cities.

The festival gave a huge impetus to the development and popularisation of handicrafts, especially among young people. In recent years, the number of members of the artisans society has tripled.

The tourism sector has also undergone enormous development; the volume of tourist flows has increased 10-fold in recent years. In particular, in 2022, 120,000 tourists from foreign countries visited Kokand.

The second international festival of Handicrafts, which took place on September 21-23 this year, also became a real international holiday of crafts.

As part of this festival, the International Ceramics Forum in Rishtan and dozens of various cultural events, such as scientific


conferences, the opening of the International Museum of Crafts, a gala procession, a fashion show, tastings of national dishes, folk games and, of course, master classes by famous craftsmen from all over the world were also held.

According to preliminary data, more than a million people attended the festival events. It is expected that this festival will give a huge impetus to the development of crafts and tourism, and the popularisation of folk art.

To summarise, we can say in the words of President Shavkat Mirziyoyev at the opening ceremony of the First Festival of Folk Applied Arts "It is no coincidence that Kokand was chosen as the venue for the International Festival of Folk Applied Arts. This ancient city, distinguished by its unique flavour, is considered the pearl of the Fergana Valley, which is rightly called the "golden valley".

Khukandi latif, which means Beautiful Kokand, which has a 2000-year-old glorious history and has seen many great events, is one of the bright symbols of our national statehood, a place where science, art and literature, and various crafts flourished."

Development Strategy

In 2023, in the QS ranking (Quacquarelli Symonds), the National University of Uzbekistan and the National Research University "Tashkent Institute of Irrigation and Agricultural Mechanization Engineers" were among the "TOP 500" universities in 4 disciplines (Subject Rankings).

he Young University Rankings, compiled by Times Higher Education, another prestigious ranking organization in the UK, has announced the results of the ranking of the world's best universities under 50 years of age.

This year, 12 higher educational institutions of our republic were awarded "reporter" status. This figure is 3 times higher than last year, that is, from 4 last year to 12 this year.

Also on June 22, 2023, the results of the "Asia University Rankings - 2023" ("Rating of Asian Universities - 2023") by the Times Higher Education agency were announced as part of the Times Higher Education Asia Universities Summit. In this rating, 32 higher educational institutions of our republic were noted in the "reporter" status.

At the same time, according to the results of the "QS Stars Audit" rating, organised by QS this year, the Tashkent University of Information Technologies and the National Research University "Tashkent Institute of Irrigation and Agricultural Mechanisation Engineers" received a 4-star QS rating standard.

REFORMS IN THE HIGHER EDUCATION SYSTEM OF **UZBEKISTAN**

s a result of the reforms carried out to develop the higher education system within the framework of the Strategy of Actions on Five Priority Areas of Development of the Republic of Uzbekistan in 2017-2021 and its logical continuation the Development Strategy of New Uzbekistan for 2022-2026, the number of higher education institutions (HEIs) in the country increased from 77 in 2017 to 211 by the end of 2023.

Moreover, foreign HEIs grew from 5 to 30, the number of students in HEIs increased from 314.5 thousand to 1 million 200 thousand, and the number of PhD thesis defences rose from 343 to 1765.

In addition, 41 leading state HEIs were given independence in their financial, scientific and organisational matters. The correspondence education form was introduced in 71 HEIs, the distance education form in 15 HEIs and the evening education form - in 18 HEIs.

Starting from the 2022-2023 academic year, admission to the master's degree programs of state HEIs is carried out based on the average score of the student's bachelor's degree mark sheet and the foreign language certificate (national or international) without any entrance exams on the speciality subject.

ACTIVITIES IN THE FIELD OF **DIGITALISATION IN** THE SYSTEM OF HIGHER/SECONDARY **SPECIAL AND** VOCATIONAL **EDUCATION OVER THE PAST 9 MONTHS**

he Ministry of Higher Education, Science and Innovation showed the highest results and took first place in the ranking of ministries for the digital transformation of government organisations based on the results of the first half of 2023.

Why was the first place awarded, what work has been done in this area? Below we will focus on the most important aspects made by the Ministry in the field of digitalisation.

Over the 9 months of this year, the Ministry of Higher Education, Science and Innovation has developed and implemented information systems aimed at digitalising the activities of educational institutions and the activities of the ministry.

In particular:

- information system for placing students of state universities in student dormitories (https://my.gov.uz/oz/service/870);
- submitting an online application for receiving contracts for payment of contracts, downloading contracts and monitoring payment for services provided on the basis of contracts in universities (https:// billing.edu.uz/, https://kontrakt.edu.uz/);
- a mobile application for the HEMIS information system was created (https:// hemis.uz/).

Also, 7 government services were launched on the Unified interactive portal of public services. In particular, new services have been launched, such as applying for accommodation in a student dormitory, obtaining an academic certificate (transcript) for university students, editing information about obtaining higher/secondary specialised and vocational education.

6 information systems are being improved for online submission of documents for admission to higher, secondary special and vocational educational institutions, as well as transfer and restoration of education for students of state higher educational institutions, all relevant practical measures have been taken for their continuous operation in accordance with established requirements and procedures, tolerance parameters.

In total, more than 260,000 applications were received online through the system lytsey.edu.uz for academic lyceums, kasb.edu.uz for vocational schools, sukhbat.edu.uz for students who successfully graduated from technical schools for admission to higher educational institutions, and for a second specialization, magistr.edu.uz for obtaining a master's degree and transfer.edu.uz for transfer and renewal of studies.


